Instructor's post : Thanks for this thread - there are some excellent comments and posts here! It has been suggested by several writers that Warhol collapsed distinctions between media: he painted with photographs, made films that looked like paintings, and so on. Jeri's comment above is a really important one: what is it like to sit for a portrait? What is it like to watch someone sitting for a portrait? Is watching a Warhol screen test like watching someone sitting for a painted portrait? As the opening posts of this thread identify, duration is a key concern with the screen test films - as with a great deal of Warhol's cinema. Warhol rarely edited, usually using the end of the film reel as the 'cut'. If it makes you feel uncomfortable watching someone onscreen, still before the camera, for a few minutes, then why is this?

Thread Title: why virtuous parents have un-virtuous children

POST #1 by User #1

In the third part of the Meno (93B), Socrates points that virtuous parents, like Themistocles, often have un-virtuous children, and suggests that this is evidence that virtue is not teachable: for if it were, surely these virtuous parents would spare no expense in teaching virtue to their own children. However, there may be another explanation, which can be found in Socrates' earlier observation (88B) that the individual virtues can be dangerous if not directed by 'mindfulness'. One of the most dangerous virtues for young people, is, of course, wealth. Think of all the instances of child stars who become wildly rich, and then behave like total jerks as soon as they are free to spend their money. Justin Bieber springs to mind from recent headlines. And what is the one thing that virtuous (i.e. successful) parents almost inevitably pass on to their children? Wealth. So here's the alternate explanation of virtuous parents with jerky children is not that virtue isn't teachable, but that one of the things that virtuous (i.e. successful) adults have, wealth, is an impediment to learning virtue when it is passed on to children.
